September 19, 1935 - September 24, 2024

Billy Ray Moore, “the lawnmower man on St. Rd. 42” 89 (although he claimed to be 90), of Mooresville, died on Tuesday, September 24, 2024, while in the comfort of his own home. He was born on September 19, 1935, in Pennington Gap, VA, to the late James “Elmer” and Freesia Lillian (Cooper) Moore.

Spending his youth growing up in the hills and hollers of Virginia, Bill made his way to Indiana to find work, dedicating 23 years of service to C&D Batteries as a service manager. He married Georgia Janeen Baird on January 11, 1964, and the couple completed their family with three children, Rolonda, Brian, and David. They settled in their forever home in 1969, and later Bill ran his small side business More Moore’s Mowers out of his garage. Cantankerous at times, he was knowledgeable about small engines and always had a part for people in need.

Along with his parents, Bill was preceded in death by his wife, Georgia Moore; and siblings, Regina Robbins, Colin Moore, Azelene Ridings, Alta Akers, Alice Faye Whited, and Walter “Buck” Moore; along with his daughter in law, Kimberly Moore.
